## Give Nepalese Street children a future

#### Who are street children?

Street children are children and young people who were abused or neglected by their parents and through no fault of their own have to live and sleep on the street. They almost never go to school and usually survive by begging, petty theft and prostitution. Most take drugs. In Nepal, the sniffing of glue by the street kids is widely spread, to forget the hunger and misery of their situation. On the streets they don't live long. Those who do not fall victim to the violence, became sick. Causes of death are often pneumonia, skin conditions, intestinal and sexually transmitted diseases.



## How it all began:

In 2006 Renate Kolb and Adelheid Schneider traveled to Nepal to trek. "There we met Ram Hari Khadka, who cares for the street children in Kathmandu. He then showed us his Project "Indreni" which he had just recently built with a lot of patience and love. As we were so moved by the stories of the children, we donated regularly for the project. In April 2010 we returned to Kathmandu and met Ram Hari again. We visited him in his newly founded Children's Home in Sundarijal, a small village, 10 km away from Kathmandu. We spent a great time with 12 former addicted street children.

When we saw the poor conditions it immediately became clear to us that urgent help was needed. "



In autumn 2010, Renate Hammermeister (educator and Art therapist) spent three months with the children at their new home in Sundarijal. "During my time in Nepal, I have witnessed first-hand how important is the sense of security and to give street children a home. It is incredible how much suffering and hardship all of these children endured. So it is my heart to reach as many of the street children as possible and to provide them with the best possible support. "
